t Union Power, we're driven by a sense of mission and purpose. Our team feels a strong connection to our community and our members because we live here, too.

While many of our charitable, community-focused programs and activities, such as fundraisers for Hospice and food drives, ramp up this time of year, we have several programs and services in place to help our members year-round. We'd like to remind you about some of these offerings in hopes you'll find them beneficial.

We hope you'll take advantage of the Union Power Cooperative mobile app, an app that empowers you to monitor, manage, and pay your energy bill conveniently through your phone. Another service we offer is Pre-Pay, which is intended to help budget your monthly energy costs. Union Power members can pay for electricity before it's used, then use the electricity until the credit expires. During the time period paid for, you'll receive regular feedback on your balance. We also offer energy efficiency programs to save you money and energy, which can be found on our website at union-power.com.

By simply choosing to donate Power Bucks to a member in need, you can help others right here in our community. Through members' generous donations over the last year, we've been able to give more than \$8,000 to those in need. To participate in our Power Bucks program, please call 704-289-3145 to speak to a customer service representative who can apply the donation to the member's account of your choice.

In addition to helping members save today, we're focusing on the future. In recent years, Union Power has been able to adjust our fuel mix by incorporating more renewables. We've spent the past decade reducing our dependence on carbon-intensive power generation, and as a result, our current fuel mix is more than 60% carbon-free. Along with other cooperatives in the state, we are working toward our vision for a Brighter Future, a long-term road map for providing sustainable, affordable energy; reliability and innovation; and continued local community support. We share the goal of a 50% reduction in carbon emissions from 2005 levels by 2030 and net-zero carbon emissions by 2050.

But the most important investment we make is in our local youth. Union Power has logged many volunteer hours supporting schools and programs along with investing more than \$37,500 in education in the past year. Each year, through our Youth Tour program, we sponsor three high school juniors to take part in learning about Washington, D.C.,

and the cooperative business model. In addition, we award 10 \$1,000 college scholarships to high school seniors, and through our Bright Ideas program, we grant up to \$2,000 to local educators for innovative classroom projects that would otherwise not be funded.

At the heart of all of these programs is you—the members we

proudly serve. We're grateful for so many wonderful community partners and for the positive impact we can continue to make. This holiday season, Union Power wishes you and your loved ones peace, joy, and prosperity.


2022 Youth Tour Canceled

Heat Your Home Safely This Winter

As temperatures drop, families often look for alternative ways to generate heat throughout their homes to supplement the use of their HVAC units throughout those cold winter months. Space heaters are a great way to warm specific rooms in your home without having to crank up the thermostat, but using space heaters does not come without risks.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), space heaters account for about one-third of home heating fires and 80% of home heating fire deaths annually, with almost half of these fires occurring in the months of December, January, and February. Common household mistakes contribute to the majority of these fires, such as placing flammable objects too close to heating equipment. Families should use extreme caution with all alternative heating devices. Here are a few tips to consider when purchasing and using a space heater.

Look for Safety Features:

Certification: Make sure the heater you buy carries a safety certification label from an independent testing organization, such as the UL mark, the ETL label from Intertek, or certification from CSA International.

Shutoff features: A smart sensor that automatically shuts off a heater when it overheats is a must. You'll also want a tip-over switch that does the same if the heater is knocked over.

A ground-fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) plug: Most space heaters don't come equipped with a GFCI plug, which prevents electric shock. Heaters without one should not be used around water.

A sturdy cord: Most space heaters come with a cord that's six feet long. To prevent overheating, never use an extension cord or a power strip with an electric heater.

Use a Space Heater Safely

- Place the heater on a hard, level, and nonflammable surface. These appliances are intended to sit on the floor, not on a table, or other high surfaces.
- Establish a three-foot, kid-and pet-free zone around the heater, and never put a space heater in a child's room.
- Keep the space heater at least three feet away from combustible materials, such as furniture, bedding, and curtains.
- Don't use a heater in a workshop or garage near paint, gas cans, or matches.
- Turn it off when you leave the room or go to bed.



- Plug the heater directly into an outlet.
- Unplug the heater when it's not in use by pulling the plug straight from the outlet. Check the cord for damage periodically, and don't use the heater if the cord is frayed or worn.
- Don't plug another electrical device or an extension cord into the same outlet as a heater—that can cause overheating.

Remember that using caution when using a space heater not only covers you from the dangers brought on by trying to keep warm during winter's cold temperatures, it also protects you and your family from additional, and possibly bigger expenses.



Please note: Space heaters are designed to be supplemental heaters used for short periods of time in specific rooms. They are

not designed to be used as primary heating resources for entire floors or an entire home. Your most efficient heating resource is your home's HVAC system, and consistency is key. If for some reason, you do not feel that your system is heating properly or working efficiently, it would be a great idea to have your unit inspected by an HVAC professional.



Turn Up the Heat Without Running Up Your Electric Bill

With colder weather settling in, you are likely ready to fire up the heat on your thermostat and plug in your portable space heaters, but you may also be dreading the increased costs this could have on your monthly electric bill.

Turn up the heat without running up your electric bill by using our Space Heater Calculator. Our Space Heater Calculator helps you quickly understand the added operating cost and additional safety precautions required.

How to use the Space Heater Calculator:

- Enter the number of space heaters you plan to use in your home. Note: The calculator assumes 1,500 watts, which is the average amount for household heaters.
- Enter the hours per day you plan to use the space heaters.
- Enter the average cost you pay per kilowatt-hour (our calculators use the default value of 0.10 or 10 cents).
- The calculator gives you an estimated cost per month. Reduce the number of heaters and operating hours to see how much you can reduce the estimated cost.
