Five Easy Ways to Exercise Your Civic Duty

America's electric cooperatives, including Union Power Cooperative, understand the value of building relationships with elected officials at all levels of government. Many important policy issues directly impact electric utilities and you, the members we proudly serve. Strengthening our relationships with elected leaders allows us to advocate for our local community.

While Union Power Cooperative is a locally-owned cooperative, we are part of a larger network of electric co-ops. Through our non-partisan grassroots program known as "Co-ops Vote," we are working to enhance the political strength of electric co-ops and boost voter turnout. There's power in numbers, and when we all show up at the polls, we can voice the issues that matter most to our community.

National Voter Registration Day is Sept. 20, and midterm elections are right around the corner. If you want to get involved or make sure you're ready to vote, here are five easy ways to exercise your civic duty.

- Don't assume your voter registration status is up-to-date. Visit vote.coop, then click "Election Resources" to verify your status.
- Get informed. In addition to ensuring your registration is up-to-date, learning about local policy issues and candidates is one of the best ways to prepare to vote.
- Get active on social media. Follow @coopsvote on Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram and encourage your friends and family to do the same.
- Help others prepare to vote. Work at a National Voter Registration Day event. Visit nationalvoterregistrationday.org/events to volunteer to be a poll worker during midterm elections or offer to drive others to their polling places.
- **Vote!** It's the easiest—and most important—way you can exercise your civic duty.

Keep Food Safe When the Power Goes Out

Severe winds, lightning, and even animals can temporarily cause the power to go out. Extended power outages are rare, but when they occur, it's important to understand food safety measures to avoid illness.

Before an outage

- Keep an emergency supply kit on hand. Be sure to include nonperishable food items like bottled water, powdered milk, canned goods, cereal, and protein bars in your emergency kit.
- If you have a warning that an outage is possible, fill a cooler with ice—just in case the outage spans several hours. Having a cooler ready to go can buy extra time for your refrigerated and perishable items.

During an outage

- If an outage occurs, do not open the refrigerator or freezer unless absolutely necessary. An unopened refrigerator will keep food cold for about four hours. A half-full freezer will keep food frozen for about 24 hours, and a full freezer for about 48 hours.
- If it looks like the power outage will last longer than four hours, move your important perishable items to an ice-filled cooler.

After an outage

- If refrigerated foods have been exposed to temperatures higher than 40 degrees for more than two hours, the American Red Cross recommends discarding the items. In addition, food with an unusual color, odor, or texture should be thrown away.
- When there is an extended outage, throw out any perishable food.

Items safe to consume after a twohour exposure to 40+ degrees:

- Hard cheeses that are adequately wrapped
- Butter or margarine that is adequately wrapped
- Taco, barbecue, and soy sauces
- Peanut butter, jelly, mustard, ketchup, and relish
 The best way to avoid illness from spoiled food during
 or after an outage is to follow the four-hour rule. After an
 outage, always smell and inspect foods before consuming,
 and remember: when in doubt, throw it out.



Hurricane Season Is Here—Be Prepared

2022'S SEASON RUNS FROM JUNE 1 THROUGH NOVEMBER 30

North Carolina sees the most hurricanes in August, September, and October. Entering September, we have reached the season's peak. Just because we may not be on the coast, from past experience, we know that a hurricane can have a significant impact on the piedmont region. As our late afternoon and evening storms increase with high temperatures making them more severe, it is important to remember how to stay safe and prepared this month.

Union Power is always prepared to respond quickly and as safely as possible to outages. However, while we are working on getting your lights back on, here are some things you can do to help speed up the process:

- **Report the Outage.** Call 1-800-794-4423. This will help us let our crews know where to respond.
- Have a plan. It is always good to know what to do during any situation involving a hurricane. Consider every scenario and what you might do if one were to become a reality. Achieving this can be easy by creating a list of supplies you might need, locations to take shelter in, and even a communication plan in case of an emergency.
- Follow Local Weather Reports. Make sure to listen to and follow local weather reports during a storm so you can know as much information as possible.

We also want to remind you to never go near or drive over downed power lines, as they may be energized. So make a plan and stay safe!

Today's EVs offer near-instant torque, meaning fast acceleration and more response behind the wheel. There are sleek options to fit any driver, from sedans to SUVs. As for charge time, vehicles will vary depending on the brand and type of battery they have. Because they have fewer moving parts than gas-powered cars, they require less maintenance and no oil changes. Finally, they continue to become more affordable, especially when paired with rebates, tax incentives, and a low-interest loan available to cooperative members through the ElecTel Cooperative Federal Credit Union.

Union Power is taking steps to make it more convenient than ever to drive an electric vehicle. We are partnering with other electric cooperatives across North Carolina to build an electric vehicle charging network that allows EV drivers to easily travel throughout our state and to the communities co-ops are proud to call home.

powered vehicles with various plug-in and hybrid EVs to understand the difference in monthly costs and savings.
