

Basketball Camp Is Just Around The Corner

Attention, middle school students: If you are a rising sixth- or seventh-grader who loves basketball and would love to learn from the pros, here is your chance.

Union Power is now accepting applications for one young boy and one young girl to attend basketball camp at two North Carolina universities this summer. Union Power will select one boy to attend the Carolina Basketball school at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The chosen young girl will attend the Wolfpack Women's Basketball camp at North Carolina State University in Raleigh.

The two chosen students will work closely with college coaches to develop fundamental skills and techniques, build relationships with other students and players, and help the young athletes perform and excel on and off the court. The camp will also cover training and overnight stays in the dorm during the camp sessions in June 2023.

Middle schoolers from Union Power's five-county territory - Cabarrus, Mecklenburg, Rowan, Stanly, and Union counties - can apply to attend Touchstone Energy's basketball camp beginning Jan. 1, 2023.

Applicants will be judged based on their academics, extracurricular activities, and two short essays. The deadline to apply is March 31, 2023.







Energy Efficiency Tip of the Month:

Did you know insulating your electric water heater could reduce standby heat loss by 25% to 45%? This could save you 7% to 16% on annual water heating costs.

Insulating your electric water heater is an easy, inexpensive project that can improve energy efficiency and save you money each month. The Department of Energy rates this project level as medium difficulty, meaning most homeowners can tackle this project on their own. You can purchase pre-cut jackets or blankets for about \$20 at most home improvement stores.

Learning Your System in the Cooler Temperatures

Cooler temperatures are here, and it is important to know what kind of heating unit you have in your home, whether it is an electric heat pump, gas furnace, electric furnace, oil furnace, or dual fuel system. At Union Power, we help our members manage their energy during cooler temperatures and save money.

Understanding what type of unit you have is important; knowing how to operate your unit for the highest efficiency in the long term is also beneficial. For example, with heat pumps, if you adjust your thermostat while in heat mode, make sure you do so in two-degree increments or less. If you raise the temperature setting more than two degrees above the room temperature, this will result in the emergency heat being activated and will run until the thermostat is back within two degrees of the set point, which could cause an increase in your energy consumption.

Emergency/auxiliary heat will also turn on when the heat pump goes into its defrost cycle, which occurs when the coil temperature outside reaches at or around freezing temperatures. Heat pumps will automatically transition to the auxiliary heat mode during this time. Typically, a heat pump will become ineffective with outside temperatures at or below freezing and will have to rely on the emergency/auxiliary heat to maintain the home thermostat setting.

If you notice your emergency/auxiliary heat is operating and the outside temperatures do not justify it, then it is recommended to have your unit inspected by a professional.

Knowing the basics of your home heating system could provide you with the ability to ensure your unit is operating efficiently. Contact our energy specialist team if you have any additional questions or need further help.





What Type of Heating System Do You Have?

To determine the type of heating system you have in your home, below are a few ways to do so:

- Check the thermostat's mode selection.
- If your thermostat does not have an emergency/auxiliary heat selection, this most likely means you have a gas furnace, oil furnace, or an all-electric furnace as your primary heating source for your home.
- If your thermostat has an emergency/auxiliary heat option, you most likely have a heat pump as your primary heating source, with electric or gas auxiliary heat.
- Check the label on the outside unit for the make and model number.
- Call 704-289-3145 and speak with one of our energy specialists to help you determine the type of unit you have.


